



The School Behavior policy

A behavioral policy has been developed to help everyone in kindergarten focus on the primary goal of learning.

- Ensuring justice and equality
- Self-engagement, independent conduct and independence
- Providing a safe environment and improving health practices
- Encourage respectful and fit relationships in dealing with other people in kindergarten
- Promoting good behavior and establishing an atmosphere of openness, cooperation and positive thinking

The Early Foundation Behavior Management Policy (EYFS) has been written to ensure that the needs of kindergarten children are met. On the basis that it is the basis for ensuring the rights of the child in bright minds kindergarten: The objectives of the conduct policy within the framework of the first founding phase EYFS on which we have built the Policy of Conduct at Bright Minds Kindergarten are:

- Maintaining a happy, safe, calm and orderly environment in which effective learning can occur to teach children to become disciplined.
- Instill a spirit that supports children so that they accept and recognize their responsibility for their decisions and actions.
- Encourage children to develop their behaviors.
- Encourage all children to respect others' feelings, needs, interests and opinions

We have golden rules inside the kindergarten: • Be happy • Be good • Be polite. • Listen • Sit right. • Work seriously





Examples of the strategies we use to support the promotion of positive behavior and our golden rules

- Awards appreciation for positive behavior, kindness, assistance, and teamwork golden rules are displayed in each chapter and regularly referred to
- Celebrating positive behavior, effort and achievement
- Posters and certificates.
- Verbal praise, for example. "Well done for ..." / "I love it because ..." Create individual charts that reward positive attitudes at work and behavior, for example smiling faces, posters, stamps, and positive written comments.

Student guidelines

- Show respect to employees, guests and other children.
- Promoting the reputation of good kindergarten in society and following the rules of kindergarten all the time during school activities in kindergarten and abroad. 35
- Compliance with the procedures and informing the members of the educational staff of any cases of bullying or other forms of misconduct such as vandalism, theft and verbal or physical assault.
- Know the behaviors that help to succeed in kindergarten and take responsibility for the behaviors.

Guidelines for parents

- Support kindergarten in applying rules and policies by talking to children periodically about behavior in kindergarten and accepting recourse to sanctions when needed
- Encourage the child to act respectfully and kindly with classmates and staff in kindergarten
- Show support for kindergarten's punitive policies and procedures
- Inform the kindergarten of everything that may affect the child's performance or behavior



Class rules that children must apply



- Follow the instructions from the first time
- Be nice to everyone.
- Be polite at all times.
- Keep a quiet tone in kindergarten
- Keep personal items
- Maintain the kindergarten building, furniture and equipment
- Don't touch electronic equipment.

Rewards and motivation system: Children who adhere to the rules permanently and achieve a high academic level receive rewards in a variety of ways. Through this step, we aim to highlight children who are role models and to encourage good behavior. Below are examples of the reward methods used by achievement:

- Praising the student's behavior and actions 36
- Highlighting and celebrating the student's achievements in kindergarten
- Giving the student posters or small symbolic gifts
- A student can be certified at the end of the school year to highlight his achievement Children can get positive points
- Children can be assigned class officials or teacher assistants

List of prohibited items:

- Huge and wheeled bags
- Unhealthy foods and beverages such as soft drinks, sweets and chips
- Games and devices not associated with school work
